

Engraving of Bletsoe Castle, by J Storer, aquatint 1810

'Drawn & engraved by J. Storer for the Antiquarian & Topographical Cabinet' 'Published for the Proprietors by W. Clarke, New Bond St. & J. Carpenter, Old Bond St, March 10, 1810'. Comparing this picture with that of 1800 by Peers (*BARO* X254-88-67), the building has clearly changed: it consists of only two storeys; the Dutch gables which gave the appearance of an extra storey, have gone; the roof is hipped; and the chimneys have been rebuilt. However, the window and door openings remain as before. The most likely cause of remodelling on such a scale is a major fire, which would have destroyed the upper storeys. With the building becoming a farmhouse once the St John family had decamped to Melchbourne, there was obviously no need for such a grand house, and they may have taken the opportunity of rebuilding on a more practical scale. The artist has taken some romantic license with the moat.
